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LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

DEAR CENTER FOR SUCCESS COMMUNITY,

The Center for Success Network is thrilled to be able to share the exciting events that led to our most successful year yet! We honor all of the students, families, mentors and staff that have worked with us on this journey of continued growth.



In this year alone, we have increased the number of students served by over 200, reaching 350 students and families with the Center for Success Literacy Program. The number of trained, dedicated mentors that met with students weekly doubled to 400. The relationships built during these sessions have enabled our students to make significant progress on the path to reading proficiency.

We partnered with the City of Detroit Parks and Recreation Department and Detroit Public Schools to provide 6 weeks of literacy interventions at the Summer Fun Center within Ronald Brown Academy. This program was supported by a successful partnership between CFS and Michigan State University, which placed Urban Immersion Fellows on site to provide daily literacy programs to the elementary students.

Center for Success is committed to ensuring all students have access to literacy instruction, even those outside of our program. As a member of 313 Reads!, the local chapter of the National Campaign for Grade Level Reading, we participate with the city wide collective impact network that is committed to addressing systemic inequities through the levers of Early Language and Literacy, Summer and Out-of-School Time Learning, and Early Childhood Enrollment and Attendance. The goal of this work is to ensure every student is reading proficiently at grade level by grade three. I am honored to serve as the co-chair of the Summer Learning Table.

None of this success would be possible without the support of our network. From devoted, caring staff who ensure our students have access to high quality programs, to volunteers who give of their time to beautify our spaces, funders who confidently support our programs, mentors who dedicate their time to weekly sessions, and students and families who attend regularly and work so hard, we are grateful to each of you! As our network and programs continue to grow in scope and depth, we remain steadfast in our mission to unite community and literacy to empower students in their journey of education.

*** Fountas and Pinnell Running Records (F/P Data)

This assessment helps to determine a student's independent and instructional reading levels. The assessment is given in a one-on-one situation which also allows assessors to observe student reading behaviors, engage in comprehension conversations that go beyond retelling, and make informed decisions that connect the results of the assessment to the instruction we are developing for each student. The student's independent reading level is then used to help choose materials from the classroom library for the student to use during the mentor sessions.

The Dynamic Indicators of Basic Early Literacy Skills (DIBELS) are a set of procedures and measures for assessing the acquisition of early literacy skills from kindergarten through sixth grade. They are designed to be short (one minute) fluency measures used to regularly monitor the development of early literacy and early reading skills.



Total Assets as of December 31, 2019


Total Liabilities & Equity as of December 31, 2019
